David Gagnon Walker is an award-winning writer, performer, and theatre translator from Treaty 6 territory in Edmonton, currently living on Treaty 13 territory in Toronto. His work has been performed and developed in cities across Canada, and through residencies in Sweden, Finland, France, Australia, and the USA. Recent projects include The Retreat (Imago Theatre), The Last Children (Curtain Razors), 366 Days (Major Matt Mason Collective), Premium Content (MMMC/High Performance Rodeo), and Everybody's Everybody's Autobiography (Verb Theatre). David was the 2019-2020 Emerging Artist-in-Residence with 2b theatre company, and the winner of the 2018 Playwrights Guild of Canada Emerging Playwright Award. His play This Is the Story of the Child Ruled by Fear will be published in November 2024 by Playwrights Canada Press. He is currently developing new projects supported by 2b theatre, Nightswimming, and Playwrights' Workshop Montréal. 

is a multi-award winning director and theatre-maker from Kjipuktuk (Halifax, NS). Christian is co-founder and artistic director of 2b theatre company. He has directed shows at festivals and theatres around the world, and was the first theatre artist to win the Nova Scotia Masterworks Award the highest honour for the arts in the province. Directing credits for 2b theatre company include Old Stock: A Refugee Love Story, The God that Comes, Revisited, The Russian Play, and East of Berlin. Her work emphasizes connection to place and community and through her deep interest in collaboration, she has conceived and directed numerous interdisciplinary creation-works and community art initiatives with Sask-based organizations and artists including FadaDance, Wolf Willow Band, Swamp Fest, Common Weal Community Arts, and the Cathedral Village Arts Festival. STRANGE VICTORY PERFORMANCE

is a collaboration between writer/performer David Gagnon Walker and multimedia designer Tori Morrison. They started producing together in 2020, focusing on experimental, interdisciplinary, and interactive text-based experiences. While grounded in text-based theatre practices, Strange Victory projects have included artists and techniques from dance, circus, visual art, poetry, and digital performance. Each project is very different, but they share a basic philosophy: colliding highly personal content with new creative methods and performance forms. SVP's primary interest is the mystery of creativity itself: the movement from an impulse, to an image, to a structured artistic work, and how this movement can teach, heal, and transform the human beings it passes through.
